THREE REASONS TO CONSIDER LONG TERM CARE (LTC) COVERAGE

As Baby Boomers get older and ponder the day when they will need assisted living or nursing home care, many consider purchasing long term care (LTC) insurance. Three reasons people buy LTC coverage relate to financial and family situations.

Reduce the load on family. Older people get much help from unpaid caregivers – spouses, children, siblings and friends – to get through life as their abilities diminish. Although such care is freely and lovingly given, an undeniable level of stress is placed upon the caregiver, and they may not be able to perform some health-care tasks.

Home health care, when covered by LTC insurance, can reduce the burden on volunteer caregivers, allowing people to spend more stress-free time with their loved ones.

Increase care options. Many people simply desire to stay in their own homes as they age, comforted by familiar surroundings. Bus home modifications and visiting caregivers may be necessary. A well-designed LTC policy can provide more care options and better coverage than otherwise available.

If an uninsured person can't afford care, often the only option is Medicaid. To qualify for Medicaid benefits, a person needs to pay out much of their own assets first and reach federal "poverty level" qualifications. Once in the program, choices are limited to what Medicaid will allow. Many nursing homes, for instance, have a limited quota of Medicaid rooms.

Quality of care also is a consideration. LTC insurance may allow more choices of providers for home nursing, therapies and personal care.

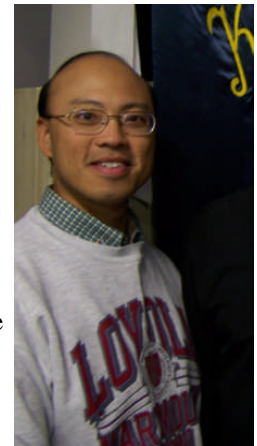
Preserve financial independence and assets.

For a person who does not want to enter the social welfare program that is Medicaid and wants to preserve their assets to create a better life for their children, buying a LTC policy may be the best financial decision.

Since its addition to the Order's product portfolio in 2000, long-term care insurance has provided us with an excellent opportunity to further serve Knights and their families. And for our long-term care clients in the United States, a K of C Care policy brings added value.

That added value is in the form of a service called "Provider Pathway," a program offering access to a network of long-term care providers at discounted rates. OPARC RECEIVES TOOTSIE ROLL FUNDS

On April 14th Grand Knight Tom Hughes and Recorder Jose Lopez had the pleasure of delivering a check to OPARC in the amount of \$803.92. This was the money which our council collected from the last Tootsie Roll Drive.

OPARC has two distinct programs catering to the needs, skills, and wishes of each client.

OPARC Work Activity Program

Approximately 200 participants with disabilities receive vocational skills training, paid work experience, and individual case management services during the week. OPARC bids on work from a variety of businesses throughout So. Calif. Clients perform a myriad of tasks, including packaging, collating, sorting, inspecting, labeling, and assembly. Approximately 30 companies sub-contract with OPARC to fulfill their packaging needs, including Industrial Brush Company (IBC) in Pomona, McCoy Industries in Lake Elsinore, BMW in Ontario, and Toyota, also in Ontario.

OPARC Supported Employment Program

This program provides about 60 clients with the chance to work in a community environment and receive support from OPARC staff so that each worker can reach his or her full vocational potential.

Some clients transition from the Work Activity Program to Supported Employment, while others enter supported employment directly. Supported Employment includes both individual placements and enclaves. In the former, clients work directly for community-based employers and receive support from OPARC that "fades" as their ability to function independently increases. In the latter, small groups of clients work in the community with the assistance of full-time OPARC "job coaches." Currently, 50 individuals are employed by enclaves, and 10 clients are in individual placements.
